# **Editor's Notes**

A review of Geoff Ball's talk on October 1 on "Milner Garden History and New Species Garden".

Our second fall meeting, on the Milner Garden, was well received. As well as learning about the history of the garden near Qualicum, we learned about its development from an estate of 70 acres, including 60 acres of ancient forest, to a garden specializing in species rhododendrons.

For the history of the garden, this began as a private estate; read "In Veronica's Garden", by

Luckily, an anonymous donor financed the purchase which became part of the University of Vancouver Island. The new species garden was initiated with donations from the Victoria Rhododendron Society and several other garden clubs.

Milner Garden is known for its large and growing collection of species rhododendrons. The original gardens had many, but identifying the plants has been difficult. Labels have been disappearing as bark has grown over them. Many rhododendrons

thought to be species have been re-examined and found to be hybrids.

There is an on-going search for more species for the Milner Gardens, true species, much more

difficult to find than common hybrids. Hundreds of plants have been collected.

The upkeep of the gardens is done through staff at the University of Vancouver Island, District 1 volunteers and very many other volunteers. This includes careful monitoring rhododendrons for summer watering, and removal of too large conifers that can out-compete rhododendrons for water, or shade them so much that they no longer bloom. Soil that is too wet can be another problem. A mix of big rocks, sand and gravel, and mulch make the best base for these difficult to manage, swampy areas. As well, there is the usual weeding and deadheading. gardener's work is never done!
