CONDITIONS FOR INDOOR MEETINGS AT THE HCP

With the impact of the corona virus continuing, the HCP has established rules and regulations for clubs using the HCP indoor Couvelier Center for their meetings.

AND many members were able to get a good look and better understanding of the essentially completed Norm Todd Propagation Centre; what they call in business circles a win-win.

Hopefully, everyone will have received an email request via Survey Monkey for feedback on how we are to continue our meetings for the rest of the 2020-2021 year. Clearly, by the October meeting, an outside venue is not practicable. Which means we either meet in our usual room at the HCP, in reduced numbers with face masks mandatory and no tea/coffee happy hour after the meeting, or we facilitate a virtual meeting using a programme like Zoom which would allow members to view and hear the presentation on their own desktops/laptops/tablets/smartphones – tea, coffee, or glass of wine at the viewers' discretion.

If you have not already responded I urge you to do so, so we can ascertain whether, in fact, we will be able to accommodate all those who would like to attend the physical meeting at the HCP.

However, based on the initial response it looks as if we will be providing both formats. Those who wish to come to the HCP will be able to do so, but at the same time, we will transmit the programme via Zoom to those who would like to stay home.

The Zoom programme is dead easy. The week before the meeting we will send out another copy of the "How to Zoom" page which is included in this month's newsletter, but essentially if you have an internet connection you have Zoom. You do not even need a camera or microphone in your device since audience participation is not essential, but you will require speakers so you can hear the presentation as well as see it.

The October meeting will be presented by Bernie Dinter, of Dinter Nursery in Duncan, He will be speaking on Spring Bulbs, and will be bringing some of his bulbs for sale. Bernie has spoken to us in the past and his talks are always as informative and thoughtful as they are visually appealing, and we are deeply grateful that he has agreed to speak to us despite these unusual circumstances.

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This is also the time of year when we renew our memberships. For many years the Victoria Chapter has subsidized the cost of a full membership to our club so that no one needs to go without all the benefits of being an ARS member, including the quarterly ARS Journal. The annual fee for full membership remains at \$35.00. (Should you not wish to receive the Journal you can choose Local membership at \$25.00.) There is also a category of Associate member for those who are already a member of another ARS chapter. The fee for an Associate is \$10.00.

Since we are anticipating that some members would prefer not to attend the physical meetings at the HCP we encourage all to send in their membership dues by mail. An enrollment form is included with this month's newsletter. (We need to collect the dues by December to ensure that all members are registered in time for the first ARS Journal of 2021.)

But of course, that is the very reason why we need to support the club with our membership fees more than ever. Our usual sources of revenue (plant sales, monthly raffle table proceeds) have been almost entirely eliminated; however, our expenses continue. 



How to **ZOOM**

A brief guide to help you get started.

To join a meeting, click on the link you'll receive from the Chapter.

Select open, when prompted, to join the meeting. If you have not already downloaded the software, click on "download and run Zoom"


If nothing prompts from browser, download & run Zoom.

You'll be prompted to input your name, which is what will appear on screen:

Then click "Join Meeting" and turn your volume up to listen and watch. If prompted, select "Join with Video" You'll see all other participants who are attending the meeting. If your device doesn't have a camera, only your name will be displayed.



The layout of the meeting on your screen will vary depending on your device. It will look slightly different on an iPad vs. a PC or Smart Phone. The control options (icons), however, are the same.



The Chat option allows you to write a note to the Host or to everyone. It will likely be disabled during the meeting.

The Share Screen icon will be limited to the Speaker whose presentation will be displayed full-screen.

HELP WANTED...

Do you want to earn an easy 5 bucks, or even as much as \$200, with no or minimal investment? We'll even train you and provide you with needed ongoing supplies. Why wait? Apply now.

Does this sound like those ads you saw in the back pages of the comic books you read as a youngster?

Well, it isn't. It is a legitimate offer from your VRS board and the propagating group.

As many of you got the opportunity to see at our September picnic meeting, the Norman Todd Propagation Centre is now up and running.

We have several hundred of the Barlup unproven new hybrids planted. They will be grown on for several years to see which ones are worth registering and naming, which ones are duds and go to the compost heap, and which ones are good enough to sell as un-named mystery plants.

We have plants destined for the Milner Gardens Greig Species Garden, and plants for the new sewage treatment plant in Esquimalt.

We have last fall's propagated cuttings from Ken Webb, Heather Dickman and a few other society members.

Our goal is to propagate from cuttings or seed, enough plants each year to support our annual sale, our monthly raffle, and additional society needs. It takes about three years to go from putting a cutting transplanted from the propagator into one-gallon pots, to a stage where it can be sold. We need about 400 new plants each year.

Here is where your help is wanted, not to mention the opportunity to earn cash that you can then spend on buying more rhodos.

For several years now, Sean Rafferty has been successfully propagating rhodos and other plants in an inexpensive, minigreenhouse called a Sunblaster Nanodome, made by a BC company in Langley.

It comes with a solid bottom tray, that is 4 times thicker than a normal tray, a seven inch high, clear nanodome with adjustable vents, and a light bar strip with a reflector that clips into the top. The cost is \$63.95 plus taxes. If needed to help heat the nanodome, heat pads are \$35.00, less if we order in bulk.



Vic Rhodo Soc will provide the 2" mini pots – 36 for each tray, the growing medium, the hormone dip, the label spikes, the cuttings (unless you have a source, i.e. your own garden, and a socially distanced training, planting session.)

Your job is to look after the cuttings until they take root and are ready to be taken to the Norman Todd
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Propagation Centre to be transplanted into one-gallon pots. Repeat next season, and the seasons after.

Oh, yeah, the payback to you: the plants become the property of Vic Rhodo Soc. We will pay the same rate we paid our commercial growers, \$5.00 for each hybrid. A tray of 36 would pay \$180.00, assuming they are easy-to-start plants. Some are not, and take longer or have a lower success rate. We would pay more for those. We are also very interested in species rhododendrons and feel they should be also worth more. Of course, we would also accept donations of your efforts, or pay at a lower rate established by yourself.

And the final sales pitch: hurry, this is a time-limited offer. Cutting season is almost upon us, October and early November. We would like commitments of interest by our October meeting on the 5th.

Help your society grow, learn a new-to-you aspect of the enjoyment of rhododendrons and consider getting your kids or grandchildren interested in a hobby you can share with them.
